In 2023, people gave over **73,000 hours** of time to run our community theatre. 7. Who are the Todmorden Amateur Operatic and Dramatic Society?

The formal answer is that TAODS are the registered charity that own and run the Edwardian Hippodrome Theatre in Todmorden. But there's so much more to us than that!

We're a group of dedicated volunteers that saved the Hippodrome from closure in 1956, taking on a full repairing lease from the cinema firm that owned the Hippodrome. Initially formed of multiple societies, our volunteers have been running the theatre ever since that date. Our volunteer and membership base has expanded every year since then and were proud to say we still have volunteers from that date in 1956!

The Hippodrome had suffered from a lack of investment in previous years, so TAODS took on many repair jobs and started the long task of restoring the Edwardian Baroque interior. Money was tight, but fundraising meant repairs could start.

In 1986 TAODS were given first refusal to buy the Hippodrome and leapt at the chance, in full knowledge of the enormous amount of work required to restore and refurbish the Hippodrome.

For us, the members of TAODS, it has always been more than just putting on shows, it has been a long-term commitment to securing the future of the Hippodrome Theatre. So many small mill towns have lost their theatres and cinemas over the years, but here in Todmorden we're still going strong. We often joke that it's more like being part of an extended family than a hobby.

Producing plays and musicals, screening films, supporting other groups to stage their events at the theatre, we've gone from strength to strength. The COVID Lockdowns were a difficult time but our volunteers and our commitment to never having taken on debt saw us through and since reopening our audiences have flooded back in larger numbers than ever before. In October 2023, our Youth Theatre production of Joseph and the Technicolor Dreamcoat saw our largest audiences and income in our history for a Youth Theatre production, with sold out performances.

The strong community support, our increasing membership numbers and oversubscribed Youth Theatre show the desire and passion there is in our community for the Hippodrome and TAODS is proud to have looked after the Hippodrome for almost 70 years. Now we're looking to the next 70 years.....

The King's Award for Voluntary Service

In 2023, we received a nomination for the Kings Award for Voluntary Service

Created in 2002 to celebrate Queen Elizabeth II's Golden Jubilee and previously known as The Queen's Award for Voluntary Service (QAVS), the Award has been shining a light on the fantastic work of voluntary groups from across the UK for many years.

Equivalent to an MBE, KAVS is the highest Award given to local voluntary groups in the UK, and they are awarded for life.

As part of the assessment process, we were visited by the local Deputy Lord-Lieutenant and her team in January 2024 and hope to hear if we've been successful in November 2024, the very month that our Raise The Roof Project will start construction work.


"Being a member of the Todmorden Hippodrome from a very young age undoubtedly shaped my career path. When I was born both my parents and some of my grandparents were members, meaning I was brought up in and around the theatre. I got to watch my Grandpa paint sets, my Nan design wigs, my Dad and Godfather work behind stage and on lights, my Godmother lead the orchestra and my Mum direct. I was exposed to a magical world and saw the beauty of theatre from all angles; and it was clear, from being about 5, that theatre was what I wanted to do with my life. I joined the youth theatre as soon as I could, and learned acting, dancing and singing. Being in the HYT musicals every year are some of my happiest memories even now, and gave me the opportunity to perform infront of hundreds of people on a beautiful stage. I auditioned for drama school at 18 and was lucky enough to get a place, 5 years after graduating and I still go back and visit the Hippodrome as often as possible. Growing up in a working class family, being a member of the Hippodrome meant I was able to access high calibre theatre in a way my parents wouldn't have been able to otherwise provide - trips into Manchester or Leeds to watch large scale shows are very expensive! My talent and passion was nurtured there, and now as a professional actor I owe that building and its members so much"

"Being a volunteer at the Hippodrome has helped me to overcome my fear of isolation and depression. As a widow, I worried that I would struggle to find a new way to exist without my husband. Volunteering at the Hippodrome has introduced me to a warm and welcoming organisation and helped me to discover a new passion within myself"



I am writing in support of grant application by TAODS (Todmorden Amateur Operatic & Dramatic Society) for their Raise The Roof project.

As National President of NODA (National Operatic & Dramatic Association) we strive to give amateur groups a voice in the wider community. I am an avid supporter of this group, who achieve so much. My relationship with TAODS began 12 years ago, whilst I was the Regional Councillor for NODA and continued when I was made President. As the Regional Councillor, I awarded TAODS (and specifically David Winslow) the Councillors Award for Outstanding Service to Amateur Theatre for their tireless work in the theatre and the youth so making it a real Community Hub.

TAODS are a local amateur society who work tirelessly and achieve stunning results. The group is run entirely by volunteers, who purchased the local theatre, The Todmorden Hippodrome, a 500 seat, Edwardian theatre from the local council, which is the only theatre in Todmorden, is an integral part of the community and has been for 100 years. The team have run the theatre with an operating surplus for 5 out of the last 6 years. Like SO many amateur groups Covid hit the arts, very badly, especially groups who, like TAODS owned their own theatre but were unable to open them or raise money for the upkeep of them.

Prior to Covid this dedicated team began the renovation of the entire building, employing professionals where necessary to ensure strict adhere to all safety regulations concerning theatres. Their aim is now to restructure the interior of the theatre.

The group provide a wide range of entertainment from all genres in an attempt to reach the whole community. An important factor being that the group run a youth group, to educate and entertain which runs with a constant waiting list. During the day the theatre operates as a cinema (The Electric Palace) with an entrance fee of only £1, showing contemporary, good films, meaning it is accessible to all. The importance of a thriving local group cannot be overstated, so many theatres have had to close, denying many young people and adults the opportunity to work together towards a common end, by building sets, rehearsing and performing together, as well as learning how the theatre runs. Some of these young people have gone on to careers in the arts. The sense of achievement has been proved to be highly beneficial in preventing some of the mental pressures which have been so publicised as a direct result of the pandemic.

As a frequent member of the audience for both adult and youth productions, the standard is excellent and hugely diverse, and the enthusiasm and energy is second to none.

I wholeheartedly support their application funding with particular emphasis on the upkeep of a Edwardian Building, the significant involvement of young people, and the proven benefits to mental health and well-being of the community in reducing loneliness and isolation, that such

a venue provides.

Todmorden Hippodrome Theatre Letter in support of Grant Application

I am writing this letter of support for Todmorden Hippodrome Theatre, and this Grant Application.

I have been a member of Todmorden Hippodrome Theatre since 1983, when I joined the youth theatre, then called TOYS (*Todmorden Operatic Youth Theatre*). Since my first show in 1984, the theatre has been to me, like many others, home.

It was a chance encounter that resulted in my walking through the theatre doors back in the 80's – I had, by chance, bumped into a friend who was going to the Hippodrome, and he said 'why don't you come along, they're always looking for boys', so I did. My life changed forever in that moment.

I performed, directed, produced, lit, stage managed, worked bar, sold ice creams, served on committee, fell in love, married, had children, was embraced by life-long friends, and now, not only do I still perform and direct there when I can, but my children go to youth theatre; like ripples on a pond, the circle grows.

The theatre not only gave me valuable, transferable life skills, but it gave my a role to play in my community, it brings people together, whatever cultural or social background, whatever school, whatever age, sexual orientation, or race, the beating heart of any community is the arts. From festivals to film, musicals to plays, and everything in between, the Hippodrome, through its volunteers, has created it, built it, staged it and performed it.

For me, the Theatre, and just as importantly the people, put down a foundation stone from which I have developed a professional career in the arts.

THE AMBASSADOR THEATRE GROUP LIMITED

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In 1999, I applied for a job as General Manager of National and International touring theatre company called Horse + Bamboo. It was a long shot. I'd never worked in the arts at that stage, but I wanted to desperately. I was offered the job, and after a short period of time, I was talking to the Chief Executive and I asked what it was that made them pick me out of all the experienced candidates – He stood up and went into the office, and came back. He slid my reference across the table to me, and it was written by David Winslow, the Chairman of the Hippodrome.

It was such a wonderful and warm reference, written from the heart, and detailed everything he knew I could do, and that they would be lucky to have me. This was the starting point of my professional career in the arts, all thanks to a reference written by the Chairman of my local theatre—he'd known me since I was 11, and he believed in what I could do.

Jump forward 23 years, and two Executive Director roles, a Chair of Board, Three Theatre Director positions, and a regional director post, I am now Director of London and West End Theatres for Ambassador Theatre Group, and my venues include The Lyceum (*Lion King*), Apollo Victoria (*Wicked*), Savoy (*Sunset Boulevard*), Piccadilly (*Moulin Rouge*), Phoenix (*Stranger Things*), Fortune (*Operation Mincemeat*), Harold Pinter (*Dr Semmelweis*), Playhouse (*Cabaret*), Duke of Yorks (*Vanya*), and Ambassadors (*Private Lives*).

Without the theatre, I would not have the life, career and friends that I do – I am very grateful, and I know this grant application will help ensure that the beating heart of our community will continue to bring people together, to create, share, bond and experience.
